Preface



머리말

글로벌 시대에 접어들면서 영어는 더 이상 제2외국어가 아닌, 모두가 필수적으로 배워야 하는 공용어로 인식이바뀌고 있다.

TOEFL *i*BT는 노트 필기의 중요성과 종합적인 영어의 이해를 중시하며, 개인의 영어 능력을 종합적으로 평가할 수 있도록 구성되어 있다. 이는 기존의 영어 학습 방법으로부터 새로운 변화를 요구한다. 문법, 읽기, 듣기에 치우친 수동적인 영어 학습 방법에서 벗어나 실제적인 영어 구사 능력에 대한 평가에 대비해야 한다.

학습자들이 가장 부담스러워하고 짧은 시간 내에 좋은 결과를 얻기가 힘든 영역 중 하나가 Writing이다. 원어민적 감각이 없는 우리와 같은 상황에서는 학습자뿐만 아니라 가르치는 교사의 입장에서도 극복해야 할 난관이 많은 것이 사실이다. 이러한 점들을 고려하여 본 교재는 다음과 같은 사항에 중점을 두었다.

- TOEFL /BT의 Writing Section뿐만 아니라, 전반적으로 영어 작문을 할 때 유용한 사항들을 묶어 Part A: General Skills for Writing을 구성하였다.
- 전체 글을 논리적으로 전개할 수 있도록 돕기 위해 step-by-step으로 학습할 수 있게 구성하였다.
- 문법에 치중하지 않고. 작문에 실제로 필요한 기술들을 익힐 수 있도록 하였다.
- 점수별 Sample Essays를 수록해 학생들이 배운 내용을 직접 눈으로 확인하고 정리할 수 있도록 하였다.

생각을 달리한다면 변화는 헤쳐나가기 힘든 난관이 아니라 좋은 기회가 될 수 있다. 시험을 치르기 위한 시험용 영어가 아닌 언어인 '영어' 그 자체로의 실력을 요구하는 이러한 변화는, 제대로 학습하고 준비하는 사람들에게 는 진정한 영어 실력을 갖출 수 있는 기회가 될 수 있다. 본 교재로 충실히 연습한다면 분명 발전되는 모습을 확인 할 수 있게 될 것이다.



Summarizing is an essential skill all good writers should have. The following are some useful expressions that can be used in the Integrated Writing Task of the TOEFL iBT and when summarizing.

What is the Integrated Writing Task?

The Integrated Writing Task is the first section of the *i*BT TOEFL Writing Task. It tests your ability to understand important ideas from an academic reading passage and a lecture.

You will first be given 3 minutes to read a passage. After those 3 minutes, the passage will disappear from the screen and you will listen to a lecture for about 2 minutes. Both the reading and the lecture are about the same academic topic, but their point of view on the topic is different. Generally, a writer will make an argument in the reading passage. Then, in the lecture, a professor will cast doubt on the writer's argument.

Your task is to summarize the **main points of the lecture** and explain how they **relate to the reading passage**. The question will be phrased something like this:

Question: Summarize the points made in the lecture you just heard, explaining how they cast doubt on points made in the reading.

+ The Writing Process

Reading

- A passage about an academic topic that is approximately 230 300 words is given.
- You will have 3 minutes to read the passage. The passage will disappear from the screen during the listening section.



Listening

- A lecture on a topic related to the reading is given that lasts about 2 minutes.
- You must take notes as you listen, as you will only be allowed to listen to the lecture once.



Writing the Essay

- You will have 20 minutes to write your essay.
- The reading passage will appear on the screen while you write your essay.

Note-taking Skills for Reading



The main role of the reading passage is to provide background knowledge for the lecture that will follow. Focus on writing down the main points and figuring out the main idea of the whole passage, and keep your notes simple and to the point.

Read fast

In the reading, you are given 3 minutes to read the passage before writing the essay. Finish all your note-taking during this time, and not during your 20-minute essay writing time.

2 Look for the topic sentences

The main ideas of an essay lie in the topic sentences. Pay attention to the first or last sentence of a paragraph, because that is where the topic sentence usually is.

Never copy from the passage

Copying exactly from the passage will give you a low score. Always take notes in your own words, or paraphrase sentences in order to avoid copying from the passage.

O Do not make a detailed summary of the passage

Remember that you are not being asked to summarize the reading passage. You are being asked to summarize what you hear in the lecture, and explain how it is related to the reading.

Make your own format


Memorize key expressions like "According to A, ..." or "As a way to solve ..., A suggests..." (Part A, Chapter 1, p.13) and make your own summary format. It will save time and help you organize the main points.

+ Model Note-taking

In the past few years, online learning has become a popular way of getting a higher education. Instead of taking regular courses in colleges or universities, more and more students are choosing to learn through the Internet. In fact, a recent report showed that around 2.3 million US college students are taking online courses because of their many advantages.

Many students prefer online learning because it is very convenient. They can study, listen to lectures, and have discussions online anytime, in the comfort of their own homes. As a result, online education is easier because the student has more control over his or her schedule. Moreover, online learning provides a better overall educational experience because students get personal attention from their professors. Professors answer each student's emails directly. Furthermore, students can take part in online discussions and participate in online study groups. This also gives students a better educational experience.

Most importantly, online learning is cost-effective. College tuition is always increasing, but online learning allows students to save more money because the tuition for online courses is cheaper than the tuition for regular classes. Students just need to have a good computer and a reliable Internet connection. They also save time and money because they do not have to travel to school. Indeed, online learning is quickly changing the field of education.

One of America's biggest problems is its overdependence on oil as an energy source. Nearly every car and truck in America runs on oil-based fuels. Those fuels are one of the most significant sources of air pollution in America. However, this problem can easily be solved by switching from gasoline-powered cars to cars that run on electricity.

In the last ten years, technology has progressed enough that electric cars are now a practical alternative to gasoline-powered cars. Electric cars used to be much slower than gasoline-powered cars, and could only run for a few hours before their batteries ran out. That is no longer the case. Today's electric cars are as fast as most gasoline-powered cars. What is more, improvements in battery technology mean that they can run longer than before.

Electric cars create essentially no air pollution, so switching from gasoline-powered cars to electric cars will do a great deal to lessen air pollution in America. Switching to electric powered cars would reduce air pollution in the United States by more than half.

Finally, there are significant economic advantages to switching to electric cars. Currently, the average American spends more than \$50 each week on gasoline. Over the course of one year, that amounts to more than \$2,500. Electric cars may be more expensive to purchase. Still, the money saved by not having to purchase gas makes electric cars far cheaper over time.
